With a building approaching 100 years old and with many additions over the years it is unsurprising the work needed to keep the fabric of our Clubhouse in good order is ongoing and never ending.

With that in mind, the last year has seen a mixture of works carried out, some which are obvious and enhance your experience every time you visit, some which are essential for reasons of health and safety and still others which you will never see, but ensure the building is safe and secure.

Below is a summary of the works done or in place to be done.

Hall and Bar area

The upstairs hall has been completely redecorated and the unsightly black curtain hanging from a scaffold pole was replaced with curtains on proper mountings. These are sound absorbent and backed up with two new large acoustic plugs which fit into the window recesses to prevent noise egress and help protect our near neighbours from being unduly disturbed.

Clubhouse update



All areas of the bar have been redecorated.

The long overdue and often requested upgrade to the Ladies toilets was also undertaken. Feedback has been very positive and we hope emphasises the fact that we are a family Club with a warm welcome to all members!

Changing Rooms

The upstairs and downstairs changing rooms have been completely deep cleaned and redecorated as for the full refurbishment six years ago.

The Home changing room upstairs will also have the lighting upgraded and new heaters installed before the new Winter Season. The shower area has had new floor paint and tiles repaired.

The lower kitchen (which had had damp issues) and the upstairs refs room have been upgraded and even the oven and the hood have had a very good clean and look brand new!



Clubhouse update (continued)

Roofing

The whole of the flat roof of the building has been professionally refelted and is now waterproof.

Once the final work has been done all the brickwork and coping stones around the perimeter of the roof will be repointed. At the same time, a long standing leak into the hall from behind the clock has been repaired using fibreglass and the high gutters and downpipes on the squash courts are being upgraded or where missing replaced!

During the first lockdown the lower guttering to the squash courts and the soffits were all replaced and repainted, with thanks to Trustee James Oakes for his hard graft on that job.

Plumbing

A long list of small but essential plumbing upgrades have been undertaken in the last year, cutting down hugely on water wastage and ensuring toilets flush properly etc.

At the same time we installed a new boiler which now provides hot water for all the sinks in the building.

Boilers and Heating

A visit by a certified gas engineer led to both the boilers and one of the two hot water tanks in the boiler room being condemned and shut down.

After a lengthy negotiation we have now appointed a company approved by the RFU and recommended by two rugby clubs in the South East for whom they have done similar work, to strip out the old kit and install new boilers and tanks to heat the



Club and provide post match hot water for showers.

This significant investment is made possible by the RFU Winter Fund grant which we obtained. The work will be completed in time for the football and rugby Winter Season.

The above is a quick picture of some of the work done - only this week we finished repainting and varnishing all the window sills at the front of the Club and have removed the "leaning sign of Merton" at the entrance to get it repaired and new graphics installed.

We also have a professional company coming in to service all the trifold doors and roller shutters.

Upgrades to come

Like painting the Forth Road Bridge no sooner have we undertaken significant works than others start raising their heads. In the near future issues like the perimeter fencing and hedges, refurbing the Memorial Lounge, installing new LED lighting in the hall and redesigning the entrance hall to be a more welcoming space are all projects which, if funding is available we will do.

Much of the above work has been completed by outside professionals



we hope to a very high standard. Much of the work has also been done by volunteers and in particular Bob Ford to whom the Club owes a huge Thank You for his never ending diligence, sage advice and hands on hard graft without which the Club would not be in the excellent state that it is now. If you can help out either because you are "handy" or simply because you can give time to helping just let me know!

Old Rust gets the Wooden Spoon

Early on 4 July, Old Rust left home just before 6.30 to meet up with the Archbishop of Canterbury, Richly Moustachioed Bloke and Shop Shifter. As ABC, RMB and SS were all waiting for him, Old Rust commented that they couldn't sleep either. 'It's the excitement.' explained SS, as he led us off along CS7 to Victoria Station via Vauxhall Bridge.

At the station we all had plenty of time to buy coffee and collect tickets as we awaited Leg Saver, who had saved his legs by taking his bike on the District Line. Shortly after LS' arrival, we set off on our train to Chatham.

When we reached Chatham, it was raining heavily. Fortunately LS's brother had arranged a van to collect us and take us up the hill to Lordswood RFC, the first and last of seven clubs we planned to visit that day on our 62 mile ride in aid of the RFU's Wooden Spoon charity. As we changed into our ride jerseys, LS asked whether we each had puncture patches as well as spare inner tubes. 'Yes' we all replied, 'patches, plus two tubes.' 'Oh' said LS 'Evans had run out when I went to get some yesterday. I've only got one tube'. The heavy rain meant we rushed the team photos as we were all keen to don our rain jackets. Suitably covered up and a bit cold, we set off up the testing Bluebell Hill, which at least warmed us up.

Descending from Bluebell Hill, LS discovered his bike was making worrying clicking noises when he braked. Old Rust considered how much he wanted to precede LS on the steep descents they would encounter on this challenging route. At the bottom of Bluebell Hill was our first scheduled stop at Aylesford RFC, where we found a fond welcome, food, drink and the chance to pack away our rain jackets. A couple of miles on from Aylesford, LS acquired a puncture. As LS and SS set to work mending it, the rest of us tried to keep warm in the sun and encourage other passing riders.

With LS pneumatic again, we set off towards Birling and up to Vigo RFC, which LS had been saving his legs for. The climb to Vigo is tough, necessitating Old Rust to use bottom gear as he ground his way upwards. It is also so tough that the other riders from Lordswood took a different, longer but shallower route to the top.

At Vigo, we again found a warm welcome, refuelling opportunities and sunshine to help dry our things. There was also a bike mechanic with tools and spares. LS took full advantage of this and left Vigo with a full set of new brake pads (the clicking was a signal that the old ones were worn out), properly inflated tyres and a new inner tube.

From Vigo, we encountered another heavy shower before the long descent to Swanley, which enabled us to up our average speeds along the A20 as our rain jackets flapped in the 40 mph breeze. At Swanley our greeters claimed lockdown had turned them into a team with 15 props. We also met up with three other riders (two locks and a wing by the look of them) and RMB kindly mended the wing's puncture (borrowed bike, no tools, no tube, no help from the locks) before we set off to Dartford RFC. After finding Dartford's slightly out of town clubhouse with snazzy 3G pitch, we restocked and relieved again and set off for Gravesend. There we spotted a rugby club on the route and putted up beside a group of blokes watching a cricket match. Noticing the absence of warm welcome, cakes, bananas and drink, we asked where the Wooden Spoon riders should go. 'Oh you'll want Gravesend Rugby Club, they're literally through that gate on the adjacent pitches. This is Old Gravesendians.' We did feel chumps.

Next we set off on a long flat ride to Cliffe Crusaders, where we attracted applause as well as half time oranges and plenty of friendly chatter, before turning round and following RMB into the wind to Rochester and the start of the climb back to Lordswood On the way we made our last stop at Medway RFC for more food and drink and another team photo. We then set off across the park to resume the climb to Lordswood. The overall climb from Rochester to Lordswood lasts about 6 miles, but maintains a fairly steady, if fatiguing gradient. Old Rust, RMB, ABC and SS took the official route to complete the 62 mile ride in time for a couple of pints before getting the train home. LS, though had devised a different route to be kinder to his legs, came in a bit later and had to rush his beer especially as ABC sang a little song to help him drain his glass.
